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IMPRISONMENT

The defendant is hereby committed to the custody of the Federal Bureau of Prisons to be imprisoned for a total term of: Thirty-six (36) months of incarceration on Count 1s, to run concurrently with all other counts, with credit for time served that he defendant is entitled to receive. On Counts 2s, 3s, 4s: Defendant sentenced to Twelve (12) months of incarceration on each count, to run concurrently with each other and all other counts, with credit for time served that the defendant may be entitled to receive. On Counts 5s, 6s: Defendant sentenced to Six (6) months of incarceration on each count, to run concurrently with each other and all other counts, with credit for time served that the defendant may be entitled to receive.

The court makes the following recommendations to the Bureau of Prisons:
The Court recommends that (1) the defendant be placed at a facility as close to Columbus, Ohio as possible, and (2) that the defendant participate in the RDAP program.

The defendant is remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal.

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SUPERVISED RELEASE

Upon release from imprisonment, you will be on supervised release for a term of:

Count 1s: Thirty-six (36) Months of supervised release imposed. On each of Counts 2s, 3s, 4s Twelve (12) Months of supervised release imposed. On each of Counts 5s, 6s: No supervised release imposed. All periods of supervised release shall run concurrently with each other.

MANDATORY CONDITIONS

1. You must not commit another federal, state or local crime.
2. You must not unlawfully possess a controlled substance.
3. You must refrain from any unlawful use of a controlled substance. You must submit to one drug test within 15 days of release from imprisonment and at least two periodic drug tests thereafter, as determined by the court.
 - The above drug testing condition is suspended, based on the court's determination that you pose a low risk of future substance abuse. *(check if applicable)*
4. You must make restitution in accordance with 18 U.S.C. §§ 3663 and 3663A or any other statute authorizing a sentence of restitution. *(check if applicable)*
5. You must cooperate in the collection of DNA as directed by the probation officer. *(check if applicable)*
6. You must comply with the requirements of the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act (34 U.S.C. § 20901, *et seq.*) as directed by the probation officer, the Bureau of Prisons, or any state sex offender registration agency in the location where you reside, work, are a student, or were convicted of a qualifying offense. *(check if applicable)*
7. You must participate in an approved program for domestic violence. *(check if applicable)*

You must comply with the standard conditions that have been adopted by this court as well as with any other conditions on the attached page.

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STANDARD CONDITIONS OF SUPERVISION

As part of your supervised release, you must comply with the following standard conditions of supervision. These conditions are imposed because they establish the basic expectations for your behavior while on supervision and identify the minimum tools needed by probation officers to keep informed, report to the court about, and bring about improvements in your conduct and condition.

1. You must report to the probation office in the federal judicial district where you are authorized to reside within 72 hours of your release from imprisonment, unless the probation officer instructs you to report to a different probation office or within a different time frame.
2. After initially reporting to the probation office, you will receive instructions from the court or the probation officer about how and when you must report to the probation officer, and you must report to the probation officer as instructed.
3. You must not knowingly leave the federal judicial district where you are authorized to reside without first getting permission from the court or the probation officer.
4. You must answer truthfully the questions asked by your probation officer.
5. You must live at a place approved by the probation officer. If you plan to change where you live or anything about your living arrangements (such as the people you live with), you must notify the probation officer at least 10 days before the change. If notifying the probation officer in advance is not possible due to unanticipated circumstances, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours of becoming aware of a change or expected change.
6. You must allow the probation officer to visit you at any time at your home or elsewhere, and you must permit the probation officer to take any items prohibited by the conditions of your supervision that he or she observes in plain view.
7. You must work full time (at least 30 hours per week) at a lawful type of employment, unless the probation officer excuses you from doing so. If you do not have full-time employment you must try to find full-time employment, unless the probation officer excuses you from doing so. If you plan to change where you work or anything about your work (such as your position or your job responsibilities), you must notify the probation officer at least 10 days before the change. If notifying the probation officer at least 10 days in advance is not possible due to unanticipated circumstances, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours of becoming aware of a change or expected change.
8. You must not communicate or interact with someone you know is engaged in criminal activity. If you know someone has been convicted of a felony, you must not knowingly communicate or interact with that person without first getting the permission of the probation officer.
9. If you are arrested or questioned by a law enforcement officer, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours.
10. You must not own, possess, or have access to a firearm, ammunition, destructive device, or dangerous weapon (i.e., anything that was designed, or was modified for, the specific purpose of causing bodily injury or death to another person such as nunchakus or tasers).
11. You must not act or make any agreement with a law enforcement agency to act as a confidential human source or informant without first getting the permission of the court.
12. If the probation officer determines that you pose a risk to another person (including an organization), the probation officer may require you to notify the person about the risk and you must comply with that instruction. The probation officer may contact the person and confirm that you have notified the person about the risk.
13. You must follow the instructions of the probation officer related to the conditions of supervision.

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ADDITIONAL SUPERVISED RELEASE TERMS

The defendant must submit to substance abuse testing to determine if he has used a prohibited substance. The defendant must not attempt to obstruct or tamper with the testing methods.

The defendant must participate in an inpatient and/or outpatient substance abuse treatment program and follow the rules and regulations of that program. The probation officer will supervise your participation in the program (provider, location, modality, duration, intensity, etc.).

The defendant must participate in a mental health treatment program and follow the rules and regulations of that program. The probation officer, in consultation with the treatment provider, will supervise his participation in the program (provider, location, modality, duration, intensity, etc.).

Within sixty days of release from incarceration the defendant will appear before the Court for a re-entry progress hearing. The United States Probation Office in the district in which he is supervised will submit a progress report to the court within the thirty days of the commencement of supervision; upon receipt of the progress report, the Court will determine if the defendant's appearance is required.

The probation office shall release the presentence investigation report to all appropriate agencies, which includes the United States Probation Office in the approved district of residence, in order to execute the sentence of the Court. Treatment agencies shall return the presentence report to the probation office upon the defendant's completion or termination from treatment.

Pursuant to 18 USC § 3742, the defendant has a right to appeal the sentence imposed by this Court. If he chooses to appeal, he must file any appeal within 14 days after the Court enters judgment.

As defined in 28 USC § 2255, the defendant also has the right to challenge the conviction entered or sentence imposed if new and currently unavailable information becomes available to him or, on a claim that he received ineffective assistance of counsel in entering a plea of guilty to the offense(s) of conviction or in connection with sentencing.

If the defendant is unable to afford the cost of an appeal, he may request permission from the Court to file an appeal without cost to him.

Pursuant to D.C. Circuit opinion in U.S. v. Hunter, No. 14- 3046, decided on January 12, 2016 - There were no objections to the sentence imposed that were not already noted on the record.

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ADDITIONAL TERMS FOR CRIMINAL MONETARY PENALTIES

The defendant is ordered to make restitution to the Architect of the Capitol in the amount of \$2,000. The court determined the defendant does not have the ability to pay interest and therefore waives any interest or penalties that may accrue on the balance.

The defendant is ordered to pay a fine in the amount of \$2,000. The court determined the defendant does not have the ability to pay interest and therefore waives any interest or penalties that may accrue on the balance.

Having assessed the defendant's ability to pay, payment of the total criminal monetary penalties is due as follows: Payment in equal monthly installments of \$115 a month over a period of 35 months, to commence after the date of this judgment.

The defendant must provide the probation officer access to any requested financial information and authorize the release of any financial information. The probation office may share financial information with the United States Attorney's Office.

The defendant must not incur new credit charges, or open additional lines of credit without the approval of the probation officer.

The financial obligations are immediately payable to the Clerk of the Court for the U.S. District Court, 333 Constitution Ave NW, Washington, DC 20001. Within 30 days of any change of address, you shall notify the Clerk of the Court of the change until such time as the financial obligation is paid in full.
